

Additional Notes:

- If the state fails to put any book on the approved list for consideration, the district can go through a special adoption approval process. The state does not require a public review and feedback period in this case, but WCS will provide one.
- The district may go through a special adoption process to adopt a text other than the ones on the official state list. This requires going through a process and obtaining permission from the Commissioner of Education. Again, the state does not require a public review and feedback period for this option, but WCS will provide one.



Per the Annual Agenda, this is to update the Board on the Strategic Plan goals related to Growth, Planning & Zoning. Additionally, our Technology Department has attached a memo regarding its work over the past year and future plans.

- 1. Goal 1: To improve the use of district and Global Information Systems (GIS) data to forecast enrollment trends. WCS is now meeting quarterly with County & Municipal planners and has incorporated those entities' GIS systems to electronically track new residential developments. We are transitioning to on-line enrollment. When this is complete, student growth trends will become more readily accessible.
- 2. Goal 2: To eliminate the use of portables as classrooms. See attached memo. This month's recommended rezoning will reduce the need for portables at Lipscomb Elementary and prevent the immediate necessity of portables at Spring Station Middle. We currently anticipate occasional needs for portables while schools are under construction. Funding of new school construction continues to be a challenge to complete elimination of portables. We anticipate continued use of portables at schools awaiting new construction.
- 3. Goal 3: To plan for rezoning on multi-year cycles. This month's rezoning recommendation includes for the first time in memory a rezoning recommendation that will take effect later than the upcoming school year. Based on the projected opening of the new northeast area high school, the portion of Lipscomb's rezoning is scheduled to take effect at the middle and high schools for the 2016-2017 school year. As with Goal 2 above, Funding of capital projects continues to be a challenge to rezone areas for new schools on multi-year cycles. Currently, WCS has funding for infrastructure improvements and design on the new northeast campus but no funding for construction. We will not recommend establishing a new school zone until school construction begins.
- 4. Goal 4: To acquire property no less than 18 months prior to the beginning of new school construction. We are successfully meeting this goal to date. Land acquisition will become more difficult as available land diminishes with growth, but the 5 year capital plan promotes land purchasing within this 18 month window.




Action steps taken from the time period from October last year to now consist of the following:


- The Education Foundation has been started and worked with the students on the Ladders to Hope initiative.

 package to comply with state requirements.







Recommendation for Rezoning Schools for 2014-2015 - for November vote

CC:

Last year, to address increasing student numbers at Spring Station Middle School and Lipscomb Elementary School, the Board had open zoned neighboring schools. Few families made the choice to leave either Spring Station Middle School or Lipscomb Elementary School. As a result of this and continued student growth, capacities at Spring Station and Lipscomb now demand that we reduce the geographic zones for these two schools.

After substantial study, with an eye toward minimizing the impact on families to the extent we reasonably could within Board Policy, for the 2014-2015 school year, we are recommending the following rezonings:

 Reduce the geographic area of Spring Station's zone from its existing northwest boundaries to west of I-65 and north of Buckner Road, rezoning that area from Spring Station Middle School to Heritage Middle School.

Students in this area would continue to be zoned for Bethesda Elementary School and Summit High School. We also recommend that students in this area be given the option to attend Independence High School out of zone.

2. Reduce the geographic area of Lipscomb Elementary's zone from its existing southwest boundaries to north of Moores Lane and Lynnwood Way, rezoning that area from Lipscomb Elementary School to Walnut Grove Elementary School.

Students in that area would continue to be zoned for Brentwood Middle and Brentwood High Schools until 2016, when the Northeast Area High School is projected to open. We recommend that the Board rezone this area to Grassland Middle School and Franklin High School, effective Fall 2016. We also recommend that students in this rezoned area be given the option to attend Grassland Middle School out of zone for the school years 2014-2015 and 2015-2016.

Board policy will apply, requiring parents to provide transportation for students attending schools out of zone.

Maps of each proposed rezoning and student population projections are attached to this memo. The projections are approximations, as they do not include grandfathering. We anticipate fewer immediate transfers than these projections show, depending on the number of families who choose to grandfather per Board Policy.

This recommendation is for discussion only in October. Staff recommends approval of these rezoning recommendations at the Board's November 2013 meeting.

- 1. Students may graduate with honors or distinction by meeting the criteria established for the Tennessee diploma with honors or distinction, the Williamson County Honors Diploma, or any local school level honors diploma available.
 - a. TENNESSEE DIPLOMA WITH HONORS OR DISTINCTION

THROUGH THE CLASS OF 2012: Students may graduate with honors if they complete the core curriculum and either the university preparation curriculum or the technical preparation curriculum and have a 3.0 or higher academic average on a 4.0 scale.

BEGINNING WITH THE GRADUATING CLASS OF 2013:

Honors: Students who score at or above all of the subject readiness benchmarks on the ACT or equivalent score on the SAT will graduate with honors.

Distinction: Students will be recognized as graduating with "distinction" by attaining a B average and completing at least one of the following:

- 1) Earn a nationally recognized industry certification
- 2) Participate in at least one of the Governor's Schools
- 3) Participate in one of the state's All State musical organizations
- 4) Be selected as a National Merit Finalist or Semi-Finalist
- 5) Attain a score of 31 or higher composite score on the ACT
- 6) Attain a score of 3 or higher on at least two Advanced Placement exams
- 7) Successfully complete the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme
- 8) Earn 12 or more semester hours of transcripted college credit
- b. WILLIAMSON COUNTY SCHOOLS HONORS DIPLOMA

THROUGH THE CLASS OF 2012: To earn a Williamson County Honors Diploma, students shall complete the core curriculum, four credits of math, four credits of science, and either the university preparation curriculum or the technical preparation curriculum. Except as described in this paragraph, course requirements for the Williamson County Honors Diploma are the same as for the regular diploma. DUAL ENROLLMENT AND MIDDLE SCHOOL CREDITS

Students who are accepted for dual enrollment or early admission to a college or university may have college courses considered for meeting the 14 honors credit requirement if the course taken at the university level is offered at the Honors or Advanced Placement level by WCS. For example, English 101 and English 102 would meet one credit requirement replacing AP English IV but College Algebra would not count since Advanced Algebra and Trigonometry is not offered at the Honors or Advanced Placement level by WCS.

When a student receives high school pass/fail credit at the middle school level, the credit will be counted as an honors class toward meeting the Williamson County Honors Diploma requirement if the class was taught at an honors level. Otherwise, the course will be listed as a high school credit but will not count toward meeting the Williamson County Honors Diploma requirements.

- c. INDIVIDUAL SCHOOL HONORS DIPLOMA
- Individual high schools may exceed these requirements for a local school honors diploma. Schools may specify additional requirements. These requirements shall be listed on each school's website.
- 2. Graduates will receive the most exacting diploma for which they qualify.

On May 17, 2013 the Grassland Elementary PTO approved the funds to bring the .8 PTO teaching assistant to full time. This would include all benefits such as retirement and insurance.

Intra-category Adjustments – General Purpose School Fund

Destination I – The Board desires to include the Destination Imagination Program as an extracurricular offering for the schools and will enter an agreement with Destination Imagination to oversee the process. There are funds within the superintendents Site based budget account to fund this need.

CHS.FrwHS Fields – Due to weather damage, there is a need to do repair work to certain fields at Centennial and Fairview High. There are funds within the uncommitted funds (C4920) in the Education Capital Projects Fund to take care of this need. (Uncommitted funds are balances that are transferred from completed projects and maintained separately by general use and rural use. It is also where interest earnings are deposited for certain general and rural capital funds.
