Booster clubs and parent organizations (hereinafter "school support organization" or "organization") are encouraged to promote a positive relationship between the school and the community. The primary purpose of these organizations is to assist and support the school in recognizing and promoting students' activities. The Principal is responsible for maintaining close communication with such organizations to ensure the organizations' goals are in compliance with Board policies. All fundraising activities must be approved by the Superintendent of Schools or designee prior to any such activity. After receiving the Superintendent of Schools' recommendation, the following criteria will be used in determining if an organization will be recognized (sanctioned) by the Board as a viable school support organization.

- 1. The organization must be managed or operated by adults, rather than students, and will present its by-laws and/or constitution, <u>along with all incorporation documents</u>, to the Superintendent's office. These will clearly identify the organization as a school support organization separate from school district student organizations and will provide details of the structure of the organization including:
 - officers and their duties
 - election of officers and term limits
 - purpose and goals
 - dues structure, if any
 - intended use of funds generated by the organization
- 2. The organization must include one representative from the school faculty as a member of the governing board. However, no Williamson County School Board member or employee shall be Treasurer of the organization or have signature authority over an organization's bank funds. However, the following persons are prohibited from being the Treasurer of an organization and from having signature authority over an organization's bank funds: Board members, the Superintendent of Schools, the school Principal, any individual responsible for the school's accounting, and any employee charged with directing or assisting in directing a school club or activity associated with the organization. Further, the majority of the organization's voting members shall not be school employees or Board members.
- The organization may not use school materials in advertising its activities. Use of school
 property by the organization for its activities will meet all regulations established by the
 Board. No school support organization websites will be hosted by the district.
- 4. All funds raised by the organization will be used to achieve the stated purposes and goals of the organization. No administrative fees or stipends to officers or others will be permitted. The organization shall adopt and maintain a written policy which includes reasonable procedures for accounting, controlling and safeguarding any funds or other property of the organization.
- 5. The organization must maintain bank, financial, and tax exempt status separate from the school. The organization will provide to the Superintendent's office, annually by July 31 of each year, and upon request, a complete set of financial records or detailed treasurer's report, including all annual receipts and disbursements for the preceding school year. The organization shall maintain each year's financial records for no less than 4 years.
- 6. Any plan, project or movement instituted to expand, modernize, renovate, or render maintenance to school-controlled and/or owned properties, or provide academic achievement awards and other educational recognition to students or student bodies will be

- presented to the Board in official session for its consideration, comment, evaluation, approval and sponsorship. This must be done before any public announcement is made.
- 7. In no manner will Board sanctioning of an organization preclude the organization from compliance with state and federal laws as they pertain to equal opportunity and treatment of all students. Gifts or services provided to the school should benefit both boys' and girls' activities. Each organization shall operate within the standards and guidelines established by a related state association, if applicable, and shall not promote, encourage or acquiesce in any violation of student or team eligibility requirements, conduct codes or sportsmanship standards.
- 8. The Board reserves the right to revoke the sanctioning of any organization if it is found that the organization's operations and purpose are not consistent with the policies adopted by the Board.
- 9. The organization shall supply by July 31 of each year verification of its continued status as a non-profit organization and the current telephone number, address and position of each officer of the organization, on a form provided by the schools. It shall be the responsibility of the Principal of each school to insure that all school support organizations receive, understand and comply with this policy by September 1 of each school year.

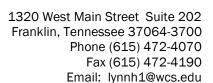

Social Media Guidelines

While WCS School Board members are not required to create or maintain a social media presence to communicate with the community, Facebook and Twitter are recognized as valuable channels to provide information and receive constituent feedback. However, engagement in these public arenas carries significant responsibility. Board members should strive to conduct themselves within the Board's agreed-upon conduct parameters.

School board members who choose to use social networking sites should take precautions to keep communications about official board business separate from private, personal communications and opinions.

Social media comments and conversations with constituents or fellow public officials made by a Board member in their official capacity and which are about official Board or Williamson County Schools business are public records that should be archived in some fashion (printed or electronically stored), and which are open to public inspection and copying in accordance with the Tennessee Public Records Act.

Board members' use of social media channels (Facebook, Twitter, blogs, etc.) should be consistent with the Board's agreed-upon Code of Ethics and Norms and Mores.

Board members should take care to note that feedback on these channels may or may not be representative of the larger population and should not be used as the solitary basis for determining constituent opinion.

Facebook

If a Board member chooses to have a Facebook page that identifies them as a WCS School Board member and is separate from their own personal page, the following guidelines should be considered when sharing and moderating communications:

Page Guidelines for users should be posted in the About section of the Board member's Facebook page, and Board members should consider use of the below language:

This page is a means for sharing information from WCS School Board member [name].

Comments from community users should pertain to the topic at hand.

Use of obscene, threatening, or harassing behavior of any kind is not tolerated or permitted. Users will be banned from commenting if, after a warning from the moderator, they repeatedly disregard this policy.

The following actions/posts by commenters will immediately be removed by the Board member (or their moderator), and the commenter will receive a warning via public and/or

private message that they are at risk of being banned from the page for the following violation(s) of policy:

- Using vulgarity or insulting entire groups (racism, sexism, etc.)
- Threatening or implying violence
- Launching slanderous attacks on an individual or group of people
- Directing personal insults at other commenters

Negative comments that do not fall into the above categories should not be deleted by the Board member or their moderator, and the Board member should make efforts to respond to feedback and questions appropriately and respectfully as well as in a timely and consistent manner. Challenges to a position or action taken by a Board member are an expected result of open communication and should be respected as the citizen's expression of Free Speech.

The Board member should refrain from banning or blocking Williamson County residents from communicating via their page unless deemed absolutely necessary based on a violation of the stated Page rules.

Twitter

If a Board member identifies themselves as such on a personal Twitter handle, all posts from that handle should be treated as opinions and communications from their public persona for the duration of their time in office. Board members should conduct themselves with the utmost respect and professionalism as a member of the Board, and at all times within accordance with the Board's agreed-upon Code of Ethics and Norms and Mores.

If at any time the above guidelines are not being adhered to or enforced by a Board member, the Board Chair has the option to request action from the Board member, including but not limited to requests for clarification, correction, moderation, and/or deletion of tweets/posts/comments. In extreme circumstances (i.e. those which disrupt the ability of the Board to conduct business), the Board Chair may request the discontinuation of posting content on the page and/or suspension or deletion of the social media presence in its entirety.

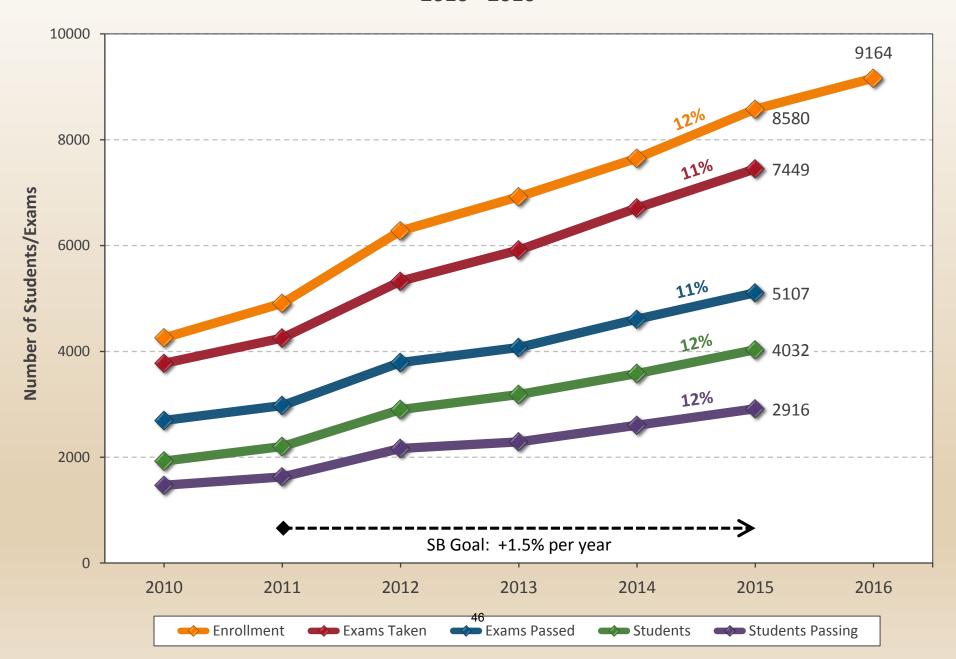

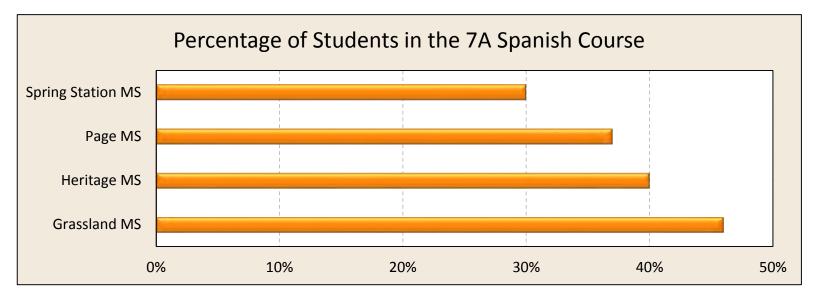

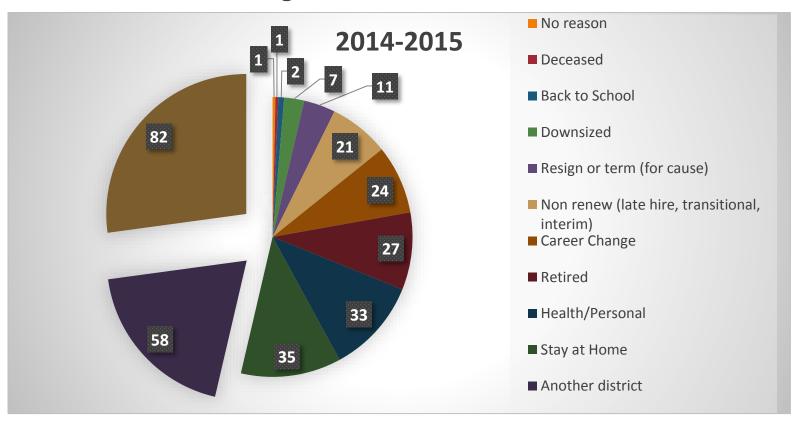
Educator Statistics – New Hires

Five Year Capital Plan

Attached for your review is the five year capital plan for the period beginning 2015 through 2020. This plan was developed with input from operations and student support departments which include technology, transportation, maintenance, planning and zoning.

Over the next 5 years we have determined the district will require at least seven (7) new buildings and several renovations and additions to meet the educational needs of our district. New schools will include three (3) elementary schools, three (3) middle schools one (1) high school. Our immediate need is to construct a new elementary and middle school in the Thompsons Station area with a projected opening date in fall 2017. Other capital improvement needs include the construction of the auditoriums at F.J Page Middle, Heritage Middle, Grassland Middle and Sunset Middle. We are requesting funding for these facilities in the current year to meet proposed opening in year 2017.

In an effort to maximize utilization, without building new schools, we are requesting addition of classroom and ancillary spaces to Scales and College Grove elementary schools as we continue to experience high growth in these areas. Additionally, we are requesting funding to perform much needed renovations to some of our older buildings which include Fairview High, Fairview Middle and Fairview Elementary. This plan also includes funding requests for resurfacing asphalt parking lots and roof replacements that are not funded through the maintenance department operational budget.

The transportation department has evaluated our bus fleet and has determined they will need only two (2) replacement buses. Over the past year transportation has invested in replaced engines and transmissions in several buses which has extended their service life. This plan does not include growth buses.

As you are aware we are moving forward with a master planning effort for Franklin High School and the Brentwood High and Middle School campuses. This study is being performed to determine improvements that better utilize these sites and provide for much needed increase in capacity. Potential capital improvements arising from this process are not included in this plan.

SUBJECT: Proposed 2016-2017 School Calendar

The Calendar Committee must consider several factors when structuring the yearly school calendar. As stated in Board Policy 1.800, "The calendar will identify holidays and/or vacation days for students and employees. The Superintendent may, upon any necessary approval from the Commissioner of Education, revise the calendar due to inclement weather or other factors which may interrupt the implementation of the calendar. At its discretion, the Board may adopt calendars for more than one school year at any time."

Beyond the specificity of Board policy, the calendar must also adhere to TCA 49-6-3004. In short, this code delineates the number of instructional days, professional development days, vacation days, etc. that must be accounted for throughout the school calendar.

Additionally, Article XIII of the WCEA/WCBE Teacher Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) outlines the parameters between the Board and WCEA during the creation of the calendar.

The Calendar Committee recommends the attached school calendar for 2016-2017.

If more than ten (10) days are missed due to weather related conditions, the Calendar Committee will make a recommendation to the Superintendent of Schools from the following days: 2nd Semester Professional Development days; 2nd Semester Spring Break days; additional days at the end of the school year calendar.

Jason Golden has reported to me that, per the PECCA law, TCA §49-5-601 et seq., we have received a submission from at least 15% of WCS' professional employees requesting collaborative conferencing within the October 1 – November 1 window required by the law. Based on the law, the next step is for the Board to appoint an equal number of its professional employees and board members to serve on a "special question committee" for the purpose of conducting a confidential poll of all eligible professional employees.

The role of the committee is extremely limited, as the law has already established the three questions that must be asked, but the law nevertheless requires the committee. Those three questions are: (1) Shall the professional employees of this LEA undertake collaborative conferencing with the board of education?; (2) If "Yes" to the first question, check the box indicating which organization the employee prefers; and (3) If "No" to the first question, check the box indicating which organization the employee prefers. Per the law, both the WCEA and PET will be mentioned as choices in the last 2 questions, along with "Unaffiliated"; WCEA and PET are the two organizations that have a presence in WCS. "None of the above" will also be a choice for Question No. 3.

Staff recommends the Board appoint a four person committee, with two Board members and two professional employees, as the "special question committee", as follows: P.J. Mezera, Jay Galbreath, Larry Dickens, and Kerry Vaughn.

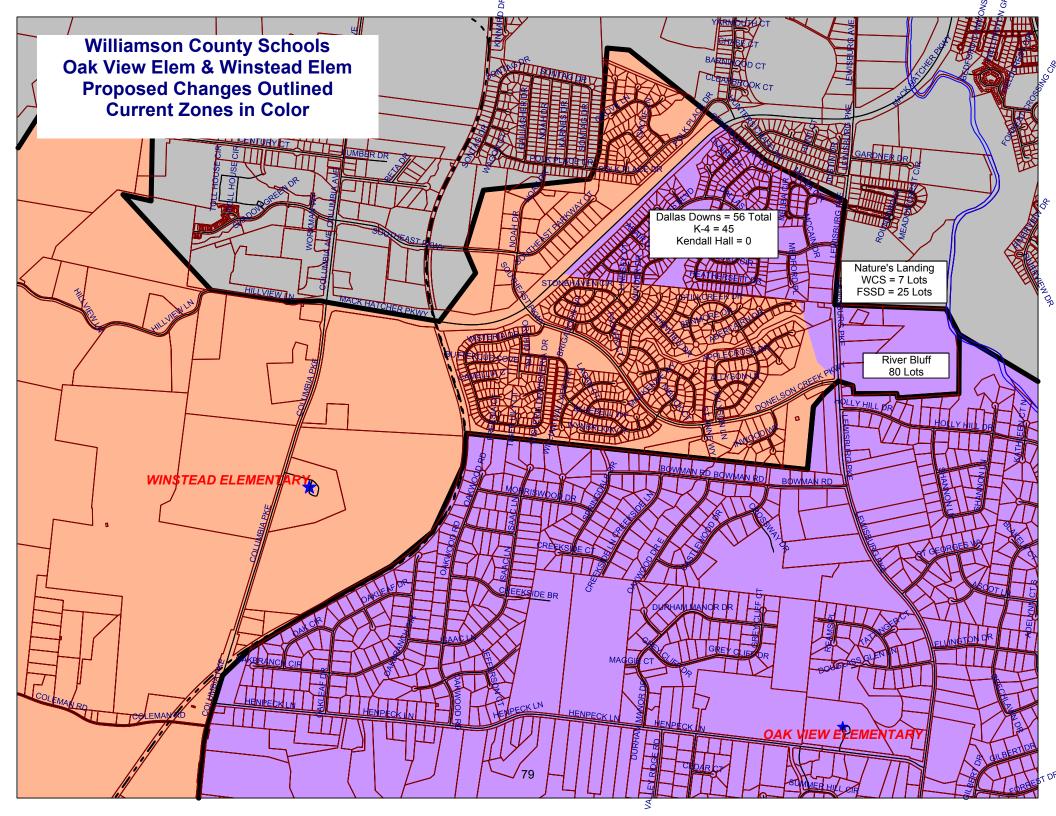
Based upon the zoning parameters established by the Board in September 2015, our rezoning proposal discussed last month, my discussions with Board members régarding that proposal, and our community meeting, I recommend the Board approve the rezoning proposal we discussed in October beginning with the 2016-2017 school year, as follows:

- (1) That the new Nature's Landing and River Bluff be rezoned from Oak View Elementary and Page High to Winstead Elementary and Centennial High, making no middle school change at this time. That Dallas Downs, already zoned to Centennial, also be rezoned from Oak View Elementary to Winstead Elementary.
- (2) That the new Eula's Grove be rezoned from Nolensville Elementary and Mill Creek Middle to Sunset Elementary and Sunset Middle. This neighborhood off Waller Road is on a tract that is currently zoned to Nolensville Elementary and Mill Creek Middle. The developer's map shows it interconnecting with Sunset Park and Brittain Downs, both of which are in the Sunset Elementary and Sunset Middle Zones.

Maps of both areas showing the complete geographic rezoning proposal are attached to this memo.

Oak View Elementary is already overcrowded, and it will experience continued growth which cannot be accurately measured at this time. The move of Dallas Downs must happen at some point, and a further delay will be a disservice to all students in the building. As other neighborhoods in Oak View's zone continue to grow, further rezoning will be necessary as a new school is built south of Oak View.

Staff recommends approval.

The following budget amendments for the 2015-2016 budget year will require your approval only.

General Purpose School Fund Amendments:

11.15. Energy Efficient Grant

In 2013 we received a reimbursable grant in the amount of \$139,169 Energy Efficient Schools Grant from the state. We have drawn down for this grant the last couple of years. We will be drawing down the remaining amount of \$62,627 for training and contracted services towards energy efficient projects. We have to appropriate each year to establish an account for these funds.

11.15. Service King

We are partnering with Service King Paint and Body, LLC to provide a Career and Tech class at Franklin High school in car body repair. They will pay for the teacher and all associated benefits.

The following budget resolutions will require both Board and County Commission action.

General Purpose School Fund Resolutions:

01.16. Textbooks

Due to our increased growth, we are in need of additional funds to cover the math textbooks for this year. Also, we are able to buy elementary and high school math growth textbooks for next year at a 20% discount if we order by December. This request will be funded through fund balance.

01.16, ELL Teachers

Due to increased enrollment of English Language Learners we are in need of additional ELL teachers to provide this service for this population. We are asking for two additional teachers.

Intent to Fund Resolution:

01.16. South School ITF

The commission provided partial funding in 2012 for the purchase of a site for an elementary/middle school(s). It has taken a while to find a location suitable for a school(s). We have found a site that has sewer connections in the southern part of the county to handle the growth in that area. The amount of funding provided by the commission at that time is not sufficient to acquire this land. Also, there is an immediate need to begin the design and the preliminary site development for the site. We will ask this through an intent to fund to approve this project and ask the county to decide the funding mechanism to use for this new complex.

Staff recommends approval of all requests.
